PERSPECTIVES

Dear Friends:

During our scheduled Staff Getaway last week we spent a considerable amount of time and attention on our church's experience of worship. ("We", in this case, is Mary Anderson, Chuck Hoover, Heather Miner, Rodger Whitten, and me, Chip).

We considered important constants our church values in our worship, such as a high quality of music and preaching, a sense of reverence and joy, the expectation of being encountered by the Holy Spirit and the willingness to re-consecrate ourselves for obedient service to God, the desire to bring glory to God, etc.

We also noted the informal input from those on the Church Council (during our most recent meeting) that we have room for improvement at helping our people feel more "connected" during our 10:00 Worship Service. We paid attention to some of the ways in which a church's Worship Service is communicating and sending out signals, intentional and unintentional, to first-time guests as well as to our own long-beloved members.

In the weeks to come you will be hearing more specific reminders as to how we can each take specific steps to continue to strive to connect more closely with God and with one another during our Worship Services. (One simple reminder, for example, will be for all of us to make the effort to arrive in the sanctuary, ready to worship, at 8:00 or 10:00 a. m. Just as it takes time for most of us to transition from our scurrying around or at least our mental "to do" lists and our racing thoughts in order be more present for God during our prayer times, it takes some time to prepare ourselves to enter more fully into God's presence during worship).

One person worshiped with us one Sunday and enjoyed the worship—enjoyed the music, enjoyed the preaching—but said she probably would not come back again. In her case, the most important factors were not necessarily what was happening during worship between the pews and the chancel, the ground level and the raised area up front—but how she felt arriving and departing from the church for the Worship Service. (This was news to us.)

Heather and I will be sharing more specifics with you in the near future, and you will see a few small changes on Sunday mornings this summer. But mostly, I know you, our church family, will continue to keep showing up ready to worship God and to

celebrate God's majesty and faithfulness, and the fullness of His love we have seen in Jesus the Christ.

Many of you have made it your personal commitment to worship with us every Sunday you're within 30 miles of Heliotrope Avenue. Many of you struggle on Sunday mornings to know how to accommodate worship with the various activities of your children, and you do the best you possibly can. (I remember—it was only last year we still had Matt at home). Many of you arrive in our sanctuary week after week, already inwardly prepared to enter more deeply into the Presence of God and to be encountered more immediately by the Holy Spirit. Many of you make it your first priority, once Rodger's postlude is completed, to scan around you to find and greet folks you do not recognize—and maybe to invite them with you for coffee and snacks on the patio).

We enjoy many privileges as Christ's Church called together in this local family, and one of the highest is the chance to worship God together. We, your ministers, would be glad to hear of your experience. If you have ideas as to how you think we might all be able to feel even more connected during our Sunday mornings, I hope you'll tell Rodger or Heather or me. We would like to hear your suggestions.

\$33 (tax-deductible) from 300 souls will raise the entire \$10,000 required to stave off the human tragedy and loss of life resulting from the ongoing drought in Mbale.

Practicing Our Spiritual Disciplines

Dear Friends in Christ:

In March members of our Church Council met for a Saturday session of planning together for a strong future. (Generally, our Church Council consists of heads of our various boards and committees, church officers, and clergy).

Each board and committee representative presented an assessment of how last years' plans worked out and also, more important, the vision for what it is intending to aim toward and to accomplish this year. It was an encouraging and informative session for all of us who attended.

Although most of the documents presented at that time pertained to the aspirations of boards and committees and pastors, I also shared a grid designed to help assess the strengths and balance of our individual spiritual growth.

I was requested to share this matrix (p. 4) during our "Walk with Jesus" year. (I'm sure Jesus did not need such a reminder to keep pursuing these spiritual disciplines He practiced which led Him to such unparalleled courage, wisdom, faithfulness, and love). Alas, I am not a "natural" at these exercises. I'm not as constant as Jesus was. But you and I are in luck: the Holy Spirit is eager to work with us and through us until they become more and more natural.

Each of us finds some of these disciplines easier to practice than others—I don't suppose anyone since Jesus has mastered all of them. Yet it may be that we experience the most growth when we invest in the practices we've been evading. Of course you and the Spirit of God get to continue to work this out together in your life.

Sometimes one of you, preparing to enter into a new mentoring relationship, will ask what format might provide a good foundation for your scheduled time together. Each mentoring relationship is individual and I don't think there's a generic correct format, but I hope you might find this matrix a useful resource in your mentoring context.

Couples Corner

The couple sit quietly in the counseling room. We have talked about conflict, about communication, and then one of them will say, "And we have little intimacy left in our marriage. It's not that we don't try, but when I feel like it he doesn't, and then sometimes he's ready and all I want to do is sleep. I don't think anybody can help us now; it's gone too far."

The Story (Paraphrased from [The Sixty Minute Marriage Builder](#))

Can couples rediscover an intimate relationship in their marriage? Perhaps, but not unless they first

dispel five myths that affect couple after couple.

Myth #1 "We're the Only Ones Going Through This" Author Rob Parsons says, "One of the greatest difficulties to finding answers to issues in our intimate physical relationships in marriage is the assumption that nobody else in the world is going through what we are. But the opposite is true: most marriages go through times when one of the partners is not interested. These could be when desire is simply at a low, or when one is too tired even to think about it. These are common situations, yet too often we may feel we're the only ones facing this situation. This sense of isolation can be frustrating at any time—but especially when the media doesn't help, because some of them proclaim . . .

Myth #2 Sex is always "absolutely fabulous"

Sarah and Neil had been married for just over six years and had a daughter, Samantha, aged three. They were redecorating her bedroom, which meant she got to sleep in her favorite sleeping venue in the whole world: on a mattress placed at the foot of her parents' bed.

For as long as they could remember, Sarah and Neil had kept Thursday evenings sacred for themselves. Their "date night" idea had been suggested before their marriage by an older couple who told them that keeping their "date night" was one of the reasons they still enjoyed a strong marriage.

This Thursday night it was already eight o'clock by the time they had gotten Samantha to bed. They had lit candles, devoured a giant pizza, and watched "Sleepless in Seattle" yet one more time. It was midnight when they entered their pitch black bedroom.

Shortly later Neil decided to sneak across the bed toward Sarah. "Don't even think about it," she anticipated his first word. "But darling, she's fast asleep and we've had such a great evening together." "No!" "Sara, don't do this to me now..."

That kind of situation is not often found in Hollywood films where sex is instant, perfect, and without a hint of disaster; real life can be a little harsher. Rob explains, "If we are to have a good sexual relationship, one of the prerequisites is that we stop taking ourselves so seriously and quit imagining that our lives are going to impress Hollywood. In Hollywood, it seems that the sex is always wonderful., the beds are always made, and

the women look fantastic and seem to have an insatiable appetite for lovemaking. The men are assertive yet tender, rough yet smooth, and never fall asleep right afterwards. The real world is a little different. In the real world there are periods, mind-numbing tiredness, and children that are pre-timed to wake at the very hint of passion. Enjoy the films but don't compare yourselves to them.

Myth #3 Great sex is always spontaneous
Rob says, "Consider this scenario. It's eleven-thirty at night and the couple are about to have the argument of their life. But before we listen to this drama let me take you back in time:

"It's 3:00 P.M. Carla is on her way home from work. It's been as bad a day as she could remember. On the way home she picks up Mark, aged two-and-a-half, from the baby-sitter and then rushes to the day care center to meet Simon, who is just six. Then she gets to the elementary school just as Tom, her eight-year-old, is beginning to believe he had been abandoned by his mother—again!

"She has just gotten all three of them into the back seat of the car when Mark begins to be sick. The backseat erupts. Carla turns back to sort out the battle and narrowly misses knocking Tom's math teacher off his bicycle.

"Halfway to the grocery store, Carla remembers Simon's dental appointment. The car performs the U-turn of its life as she heads for the other end of town. After a lengthy appointment and complete with groceries, kids, and a squelchy backpack, she staggers through the door. She begins dinner surrounded by a dog, a hamster on the loose, and a child complaining that the dentist took the wrong tooth out.

"The rest of the evening is a mixture of stories, glasses of water, and Mark getting sick again. When this woman hits 11:00 P.M. she is practically comatose. When her husband suggests sex at 11:30 she refuses, and then as he lies with his back to her, she begins to feel guilty. She wonders "Am I abnormal? The answer is "No—just sane."

Rob says, "I quite understand that the scenario could be reversed, however in any event, times when we feel shattered are not the best to develop a good sex life.

Jim Boston, a psycho-sexual therapist comments, "For that very reason many couples have

discovered that "planned sex" is not such a bad idea. One husband put it like this: "I know it sounds a bit clinical but life is so hectic we found that if we didn't plan ahead we were just too tired. I'm not saying it will work for everybody, but we have come to regard those nights as special. Of course it can still happen spontaneously, but we're beginning to see the value of taking our intimate relationship seriously. Couples say they don't have time, but so often it's because they don't make time.

Myth #4 Relationship doesn't matter
"When we are counseling we will often ask a couple, "If you could change anything in your relationship, what would it be?" The man will usually answer "Sex. I wish my wife wanted sex more often." We turn to the woman. She pauses and then says, "Affection. I wish he was more affectionate." We ask, "How could he show that to you?" She will say, "I wish that some nights he would just hold me when we are together. I wish when we shop together he would occasionally hold my hand instead of walking ten yards ahead. I want him to listen to me when I share my heart. I want to know I matter."

Myth #5 "Our sex life is gone forever"
"I know it's not true. I meet many couples who rediscover an intimate relationship with their spouse that they believed could never return. After almost fifteen years of marriage, Kevin decided to do something about their physical relationship other than complain. He began to go out with his wife alone rather than always with friends; he stopped complaining about the few extra pounds she had put on and started to compliment her again; he began to touch her more; and most important of all, he did all of that without any expectation of sex later that day. Their sex life changed when his wife began to believe that she mattered.

The Lesson – Keep love alive

"We can find answers. Some couples are helped by seeing a professional counselor, others by reading a book, but countless more by being real and honest with each other and working toward showing each other that he/she does matter.

The Action Steps

- Hold hands more often
- Practice touching in a non-sexual way
- Let your children see that you respect your partner
- Try not to be completely predictable



Creating Sacred Spaces: John Bell Weekend

John Bell of the Iona Community has a gift for uniting voices in simple harmonies from all over the world. Through his music and teaching, he will help us create a sacred meeting ground where God can enter more fully into our lives. From the gifts of John Bell's own experience of Jesus, the songs of the global church, and the spirituality of the ancient Celts, we will learn new ways of opening ourselves and our communities to living more fully with God.

We start at 6:00 with a sit down dinner upstairs and teaching by John Bell about Jesus at 7:00 with time for prayer and discussion, ending at 9:00. On Saturday we have an hour for a continental breakfast and welcoming time starting at 9 a.m., the program with John Bell begins at 10:00 and runs through 1:00 with a break. At 1:00 is lunch followed by one last session with John Bell and a blessing as we leave this sacred space at 3:30.

Children are invited to join us from 10 – 11:15 on Saturday morning at no cost to learn some new songs which we can continue in our Sunday School.

Who is John Bell?

John Bell began in youth ministry for the Presbyterian Church in Scotland. One day, based on a recommendation from his father, he went to a city center café in Glasgow where homeless people and teachers, activists and gamblers, would come for inexpensive and wholesome food. In the middle of that café, the Iona community would hold a worship service. Mr. Bell was intrigued by and joined with the community and began to help lead worship because this was “a place where the potentials of the socially marginalized as well as the socially successful would be attested.”

John Bell pulled together song and prayers and Biblical reflection to create a worship which reached 400 – 500 young people each month at what became known as the “Last of the Month.” Worship was around themes which were important to young people who had never been in church, never read the Bible. Young people in Europe became excited about following Jesus.

Mr. Bell continues to weave together song and prayers and teachings to reach us in the mainline church, to awaken us to new possibilities within our worship in church and in our lives. He has become a leading transcriber of songs from around the world for worship including them within the songs published out of the Wild Goose Publishing Group (we can find the resources through GIA). He intentionally does not create a book of world songs but includes them in the song books the WGPG puts out: “It is time to integrate world songs within the body of Western song as a symbol of Christian unity” (214).

We are excited to invite you to the weekend, July 29 – 31. You will be in the presence of a down to earth, faithful visionary who walks with Jesus. There will joy and laughter and song! Cost is \$40/each for our members and their friends for meals and to experience what drew so many to worship in a café in Glasgow. Please register by July 8th by writing a check to “Community Church, Congregational,” memo, “John Bell Event.” Please include names of those coming. Registration forms are on the website, in the church office, and on the church patio after Sunday Worship.

Last month I enjoyed the luxury of leading a number of the men in our church on our retreat. Our theme was to explore how four specific men in the gospels were changed by their relationships with Jesus, and we looked for insights and principles which may help to guide how we live today.

The teaching I presented is but one of the components of this retreat. Every man present is given private time to meditate and pray and journal on a particular topic, and then we all gather together in small groups to share our responses and to listen to one another.

I know I'm not the only one who appreciates this discussion time. (Frankly, I think a lot of us guys are not very comfortable with letting other men know what's going on within us... we can always use the practice). Through the years, and perhaps also as a result of our small group participation, many of us have come to trust one another very much and to be candid, as appropriate, during these retreats. We discover we have a lot in common; we also learn we are each quite different in ways which must make God laugh.

On this retreat we schedule time for recreation, as well. Glen Ivy is a terrific venue and many of us were on the adjacent golf course Saturday afternoon. (Some were playing golf; I was the one out there in the white shirt pretending to play).

Between Friday afternoon and Sunday noon, we all come to recognize again how we belong to one another. The Holy Spirit is always faithful to be with us and to deepen our bonds together. 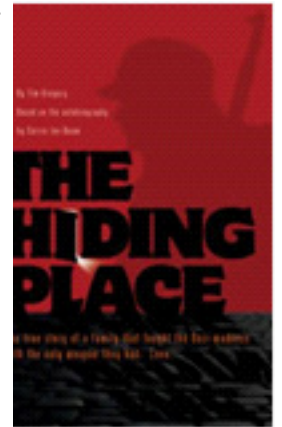
